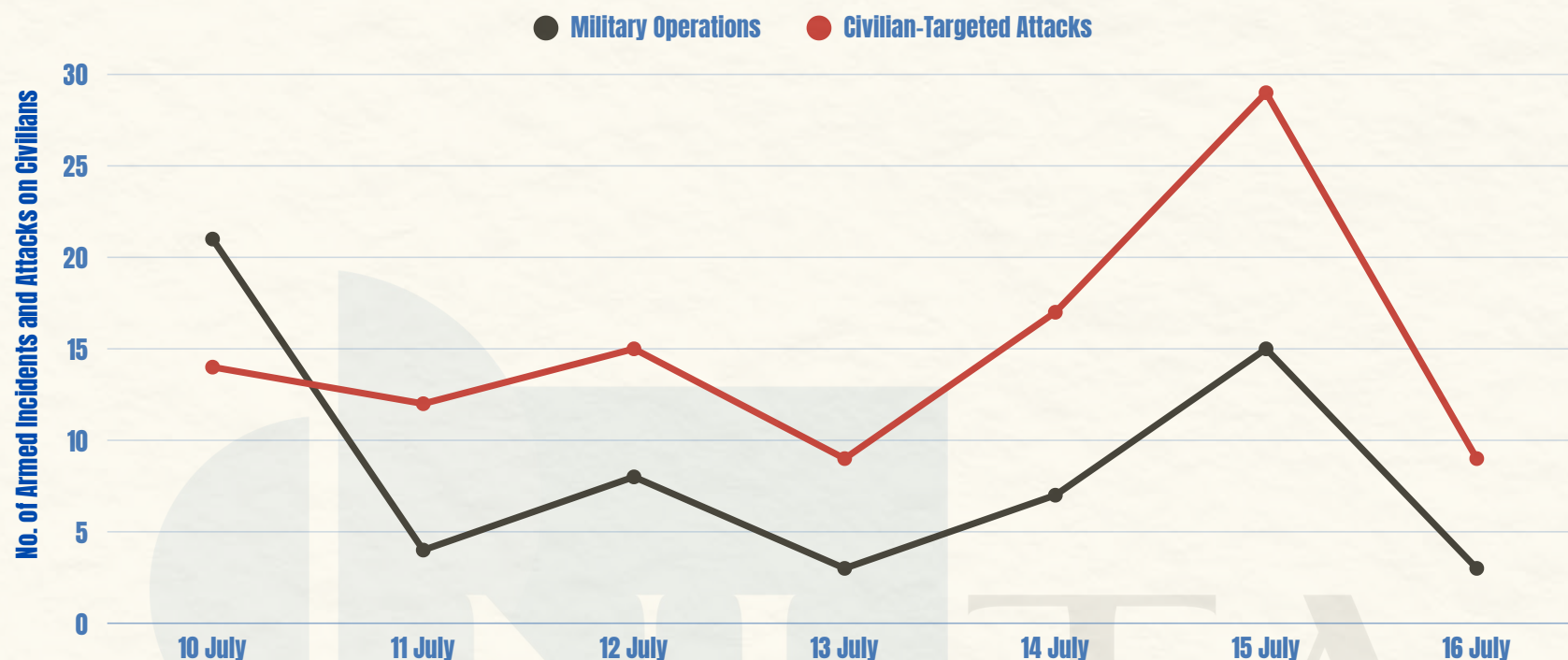


AT A GLANCE

ON ARMED STRUGGLES

REPORTING PERIOD: 10 JULY - 16 JULY 2026



Between 10 July and 16 July 2026, there were at least 166 incidents of military operations and civilian-targeted attacks across the country. Among them, at least 61 incidents were military operations, and 105 incidents were civilian-targeted attacks.

Justice For Myanmar (JFM) issued a statement on 15 July warning that engagement with Myanmar's military junta, which continues to disregard ASEAN's Five-Point Consensus, would effectively enable the junta to continue committing international crimes with impunity. According to JFM, ASEAN has continued to violate the Five-Point Consensus that it adopted on 24 April, 2021, and this has further reinforced its complicity in the international crimes allegedly committed by Myanmar's military junta. The statement also pointed out that companies from ASEAN member states, including Thailand, Vietnam and Singapore, may have links with the junta. As an example, it cited Thailand's partially state-owned energy company PTTEP, which continues to operate two major offshore natural gas projects in Myanmar in partnership with the military junta. Meanwhile, ASEAN Parliamentarians for Human Rights (APHR) also warned on 15 July that ASEAN's renewed engagement with Myanmar's military junta has failed to produce any tangible benefits for the people of Myanmar and risks further legitimizing military rule.

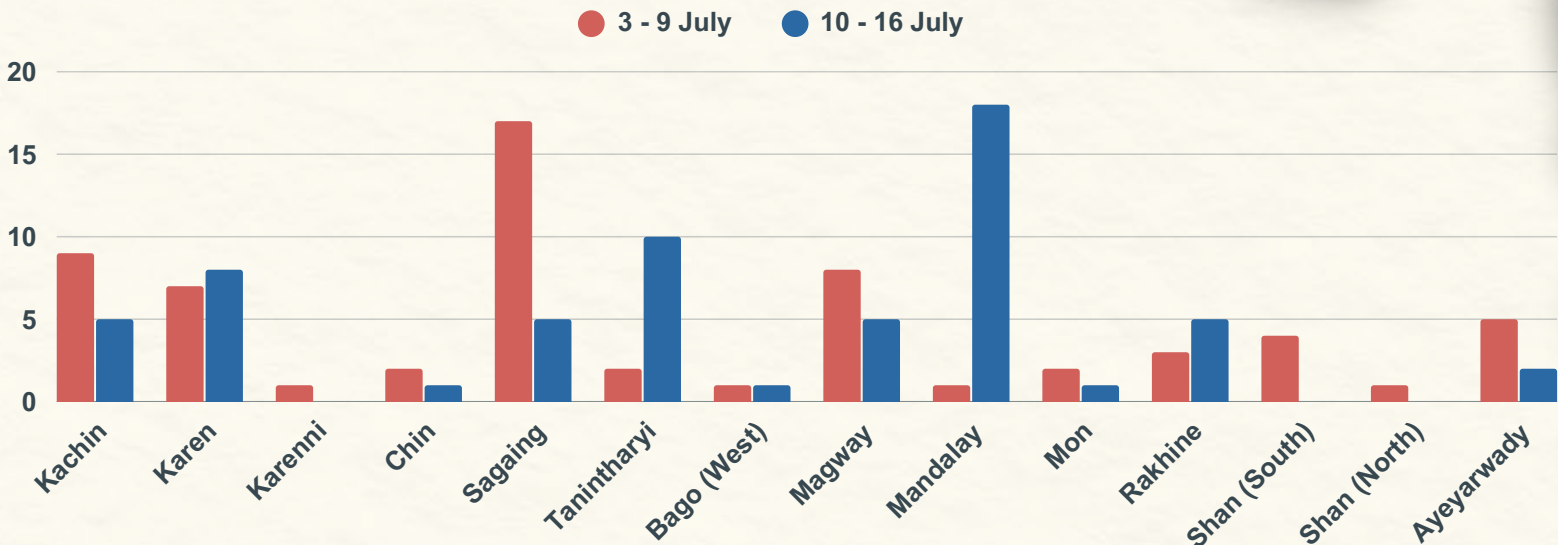

WEEKLY ARMED INCIDENTS

During the reporting period, at least 61 armed incidents were reported in 24 townships across the country. Mandalay Region was recorded the highest number of incidents with 18 incidents. Compared to the previous week, the number of armed clashes decreased.

Combat engagements were recorded as the highest attack type with 49 incidents. Of these, seven involved capturing of outposts and a town. Armed resistance forces captured two junta outposts in Madaya Township, Mandalay Region on 27 June. Likewise, the Kachin Independence Army seized three junta outposts in Kachin's Khaunglanhpu Township on July 10, 12, and 13, respectively. Meanwhile, the junta captured a KNLA outpost in Karen's Myawaddy Township, on 13 July, and also captured Chin's Thantlang Town, previously held by Chin resistance forces, on 16 July.

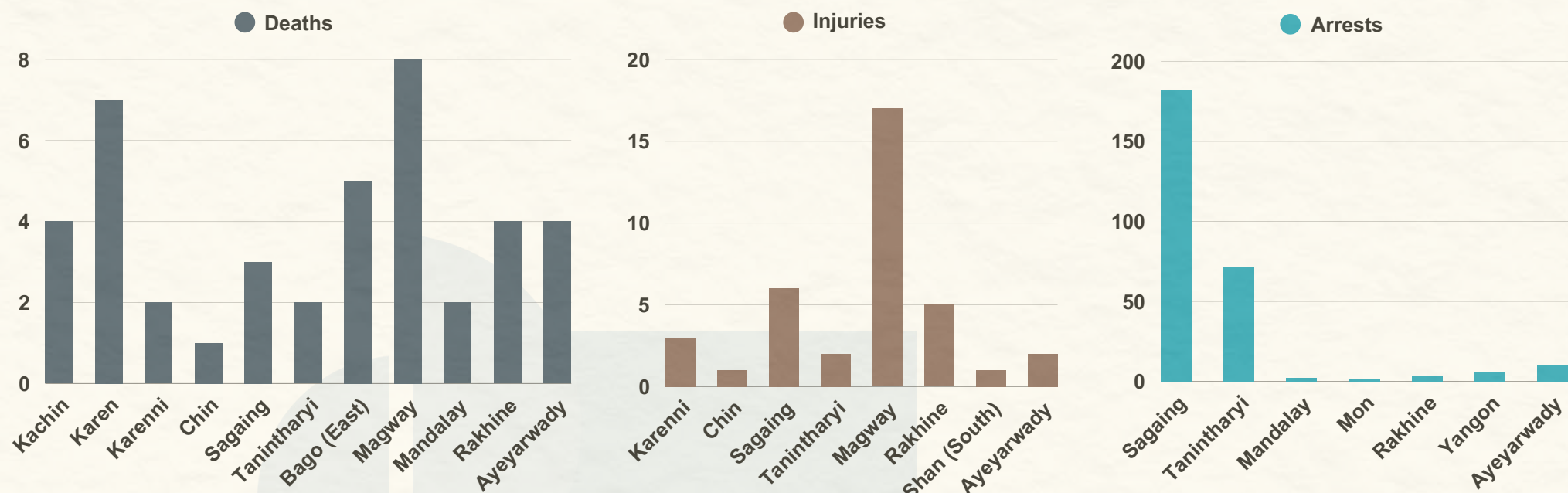
It was observed that there were no armed clashes in Bago (East), Nay Pyi Taw, Yangon and Shan (East) regions during the reporting period. Additionally, Karenni, Shan (South), Shan (North) regions also reported no military operations this week although incidents were recorded in the previous week.

CIVILIAN TARGETED ATTACKS

During the reporting period, at least 105 incidents of civilian-targeted attacks were reported in 46 townships. During these incidents, at least 42 civilians were killed, 37 others were injured while 275 civilians were arbitrarily arrested. Of these incidents, the junta’s village raids were recorded as the highest with 41 incidents. The junta’s airstrikes were recorded as the second highest with 25 incidents while arrest cases were the third highest with 17 incidents. Compared to the previous week, the number of civilian-targeted attacks increased.

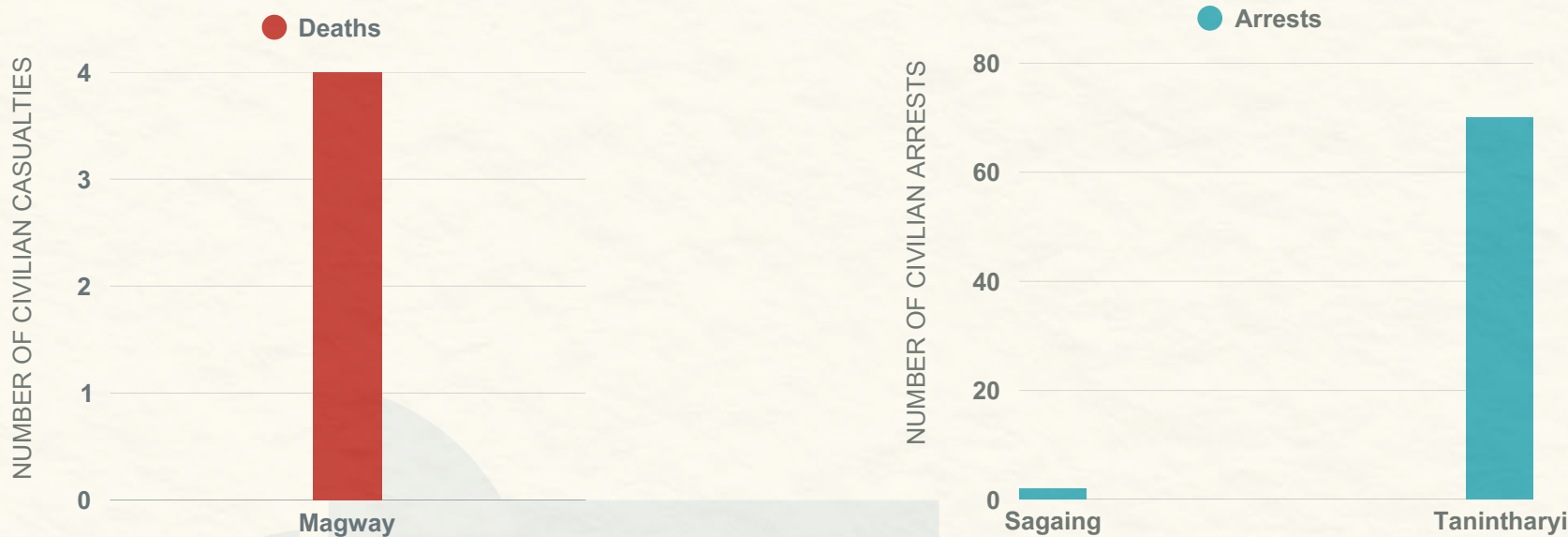
The highest number of civilian casualties was reported in Magway Region, with eight deaths and 17 injuries. Sagaing and Rakhine Regions marked as the regions with the second highest number of civilian casualties, with at least nine each. The third highest region was Karen, with at least seven civilian deaths.

Meanwhile, the highest number of civilian arrests was reported in Sagaing Region with 182 detainees during the reporting period. Tanintharyi Region was recorded the second highest of civilian arrests with 71 detainees while Ayeyarwady was the third highest with 10 detainees.

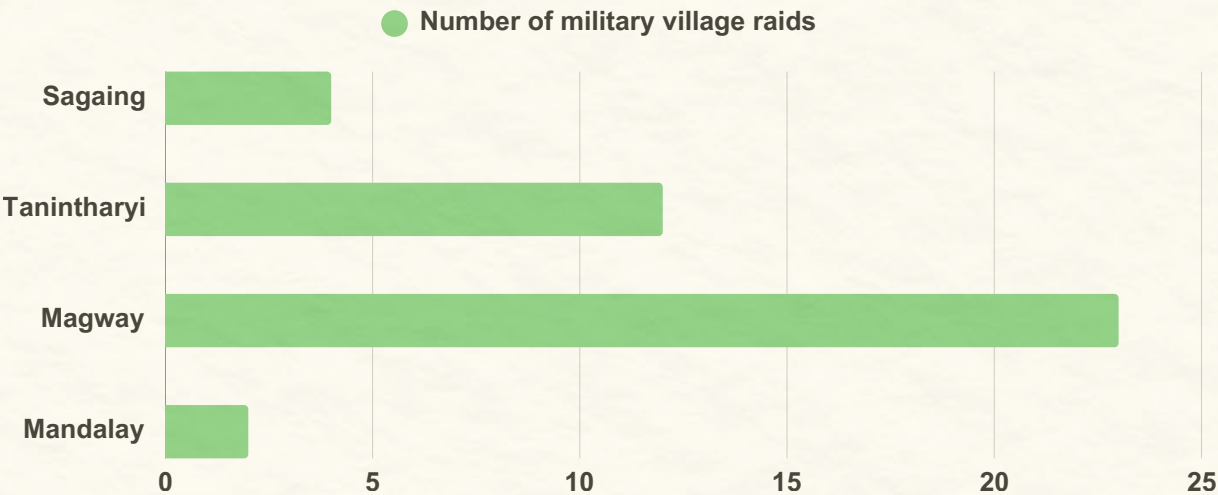

MILITARY VILLAGE RAIDS

During the reporting period, at least 41 incidents of village raids conducted by the military junta were reported in 10 townships across the country. In these incidents, four civilians were killed and 72 others were arrested. Magway was recorded as the highest incident of village raids with 23 incidents. The second highest was Tanintharyi Region with 12 incidents while the third was Sagaing Region with four incidents.

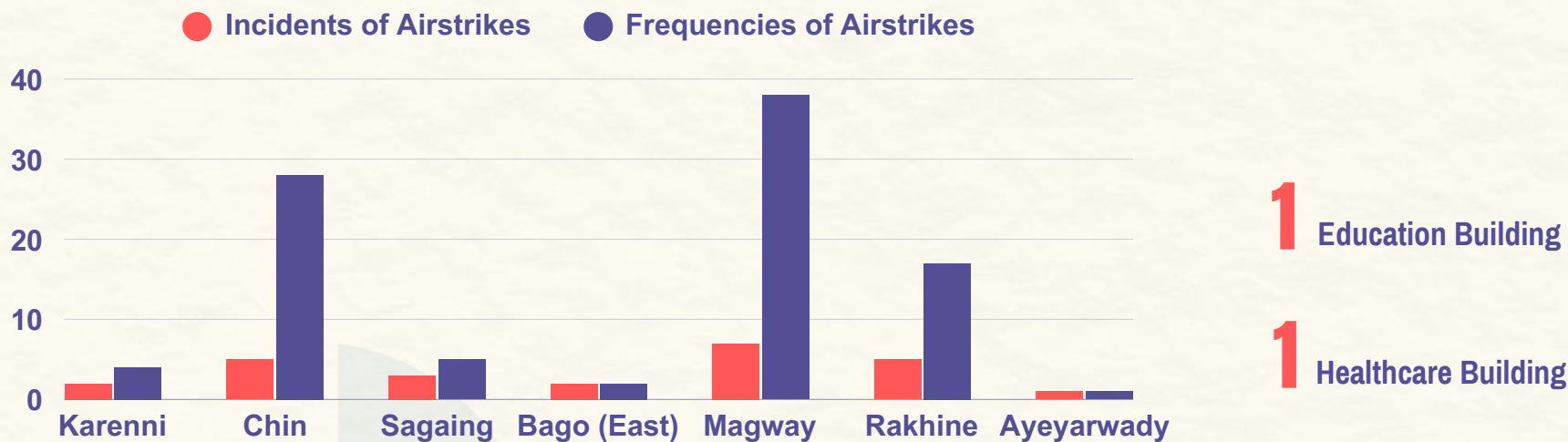
Significantly, 20 out of total 41 military village raid incidents occurred in Myaing and Chauk Townships, Magway Region. The incident with the highest number of civilian casualties took place in Myaing Township, Magway Region. On 14 July, a column of military junta raided three villages in Myaing Township, killing four male civilians.

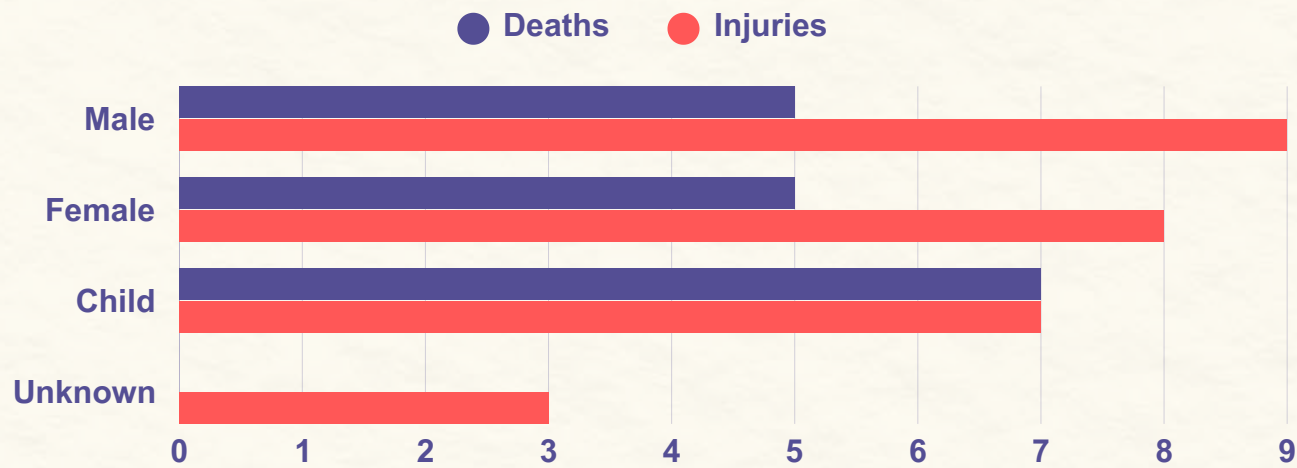

MILITARY AIRSTRIKES ON CIVILIANS

During the reporting period, at least 25 incidents of civilian-targeted airstrikes committed by the military junta were reported across 15 townships of seven regions. In these incidents, 12 civilians were killed and 27 others were injured. Majority of airstrikes was reported in Magway Region with seven incidents.

Significantly, on 10 July, the military junta conducted an airstrike using a fighter jet on a village in Gwa Township, Rakhine. The attack reportedly killed two male civilians, one female and one child, and injured two male others. Additionally, on 14 July, the military junta also conducted an airstrike on a village school in Natmauk Township, Magway, killing one child and injuring one female civilian and seven children.



METHODOLOGY

This report by the Nyan Lynn Thit Analytica (NLTA) aims to examine armed clashes between the military and armed revolutionary forces and internal conflicts between armed revolutionary forces including civilian casualties. Data has been collected from 43 news media and announcements of revolutionary organizations. The actual data on the ground might be higher than the numbers presented in this report. This report excludes unverified armed incidents and casualties, which will be reported in future reports once verified. An incident is counted as a single attack if one target is attacked either by the military junta or armed revolutionary forces, which include the People Defense Forces (PDFs) and Ethnic Revolutionary Organizations (EROs). Additionally, the report analyzed civilian casualties in two categories: those resulting from armed incidents and those from targeted attacks.
